PLENARY

Jessica Nelson

Dr. Jessica Nelson is Program Director and an epidemiologist with the Minnesota Biomonitoring Program at the Minnesota Department of Health. She works on design, coordination, analysis, and communication about biomonitoring projects. She has served as the Principal Investigator for different biomonitoring projects, including the Minnesota Family Environmental Exposure Tracking (MN FEET) study that measured heavy metals in Twin Cities women and babies. MN FEET found links between using skin lightening creams and higher levels of urine mercury. Jessica received her PhD and MPH in Environmental Health from Boston University School of Public Health.





KEYNOTE

Kavitha Emmanuel

Founder and director of Dark Is Beautiful Campaign, founder of the Women of Worth movement (www.womenofworth.in).

Kavitha Emmanuel is a trainer, executive coach, and founder of the Women of Worth movement (www.womenofworth.in) specializing in Transformational Leadership. She launched the Dark is Beautiful campaign in March 2009 to address the toxic belief that a person's worth is measured by the colour of their skin. The campaign went viral on social media in 2013. Though the campaign was originally meant to address the problem of Colourism in India, it garnered support and attention across the globe since its launch and continues to gather momentum every year. Ms. Emmanuel has appeared in multiple media interviews in over 30 countries since the launch of the campaign. The campaign motivated the initiation of several research papers on Colourism in leading universities like Harvard. The cascading impact of the campaign continues to grow across the globe with channels like HBO Vice, NPR, Al Jazeera, Netflix, and CNN continuing to highlight the work of the Dark is Beautiful campaign.





KEYNOTE

Dr. Amina Mire

Dr. Amina Mire is an Associate Professor of Sociology in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, of Carleton University (Ottawa, Canada).

Research:

Anti-racism, women and health, STEM and Gender, bioethics, medical humanities, and the biomedicalization of ageing. Her book, Wellness in Whiteness: Biomedicalization and the Promotion of Whiteness and Youth among Women, was published to great acclaim by Routledge in 2020. She is currently working on a new book entitled "The Changing Meaning of Skin Whitening (Lexington Boos, Imprint of Roman& Littlefield Publishing Group). Changing Meaning of Skin Whitening (Forthcoming 2022) takes historically grounded sociological approach and seeks to delineate rebranding of the skin whitening industry in response to the demands of the BLM movement and seeks to critically interrogate broader implications of rebranding racist marketing in the skin whitening industry in wake of global response to the decolonizing demands of the BLM movement.

His senior year at Hamline he participated in community engaged research on skin lightening in the Hmong community conducting focus groups and literature reviews and then later applied for and received a Truth, Racial Healing and Transformation mini grant to conduct research in his own community on generational and gendered experiences with colorism and skin lightening in his own Somali community in the Twin Cities, Minnesota. After graduation, he moved to Tanzania with Peace Corps working as a Health Extension Volunteer where he helped promote healthy behaviors on a community level. He is currently enrolled in a MPH at The George Washington University in Global Epidemiology and Disease Control in Washington DC and also works as a Behavioral Health Case Lead at Cigna.
